Major Interventions (Overall funding 470+ Crore)

The Indian sports ecosystem has seen unprecedented growth in the last five years with Paris Olympics bound athletes receiving exposure to international competitions as well as national camps conducted overseas as well, funded through Government's flagship Target Olympic Podium Scheme (TOPS) and CSR budget of various Public Sector Undertakings as well as top corporates. The discipline wise major support provided has been mentioned.

Archery (Total funding: ₹ 39.18 crore)

A total of 41 national camps and 24 foreign exposure trips were supported by the Indian government in the Paris Olympics cycle (2021-24) that included 5 TOPS core and 13 development archers.

Athletics (Total funding: ₹ 96.08 crore)

A 28-member track & field squad will be representing India in Paris Olympics. A total of 36 national camps and 85 foreign exposure trips were supported by the Indian government that included 23 TOPS core and 13 development track & field athletes.

Badminton (Total funding: ₹72.03 crore)

A total of 13 national camps and 81 foreign exposure trips were supported in the Paris cycle that included 10 TOPS core and 15 development shuttlers.

Boxing (Total funding: ₹ 60.93 crore)

A total of 17 national camps and 23 foreign exposure trips were supported in the buildup to the Olympic Games in Paris that included 9 TOPS core and 20 development pugilists

Hockey (Total funding: ₹41.30 crore)

The Indian hockey team returned with a bronze medal in Tokyo 2020, ending a 41-year wait for a podium finish. A total of 76 national camps and 36 foreign exposure trips were supported by the Indian government for Paris 2024 that included 33 TOPS core players

Judo (Total funding: ₹ 6.33 crore)

Tulika Maan is the lone Indian judoka to have qualified for Paris 2024 in the 78kg class. A total of 6 national camps and 15 foreign exposure trips were supported in the build-up to the Olympic Games that included 9 TOPS development judokas

Rowing (Total funding: ₹ 3.89 crore)

Balraj Panwar is the lone Indian rower to have qualified for the Summer Olympics in men's single sculls event. A total of 16 national camps and 9 foreign exposure trips were supported in the build-up to Paris 2024 that included 3 TOPS core and as many development rowers.

Shooting (Total funding: ₹ 60.42 crore)

With 21 shooters set to compete in Paris 2024, the Indian government opened their coffers for providing the best financial support in preparation for the quadrennial extravaganza. A total of 96 foreign exposure trips and 45 national camp were supported in the build-up to Summer Olympics that included 25 TOPS core and 20 development shooters.

Swimming (Total funding: ₹ 3.90 crore)

Srihari Nataraj (100m backstroke) and Dhinidhi Desinghu (200m freestyle) qualified for Paris 2024 through Universality quota. A total of 9 national camps and 25 foreign exposure trips were supported that included one TOPS core and one development swimmers.

Table Tennis (Total funding: ₹ 12.92 crore)

A total of 7 national camps and 173 foreign exposure trips were supported for Paris cycle that included 7 TOPS core and 5 development paddlers.

Weightlifting (Total funding: ₹ 27 crore)

Olympic silver medallist Mirabai Chanu will be the lone hope for a medal in 49kg weightlifting from the country. A total of 9 international competitions and 9 national camps were supported by the Indian government for Paris 2024 cycle that included 2 TOPS core and 6 development lifters.

Wrestling (Total funding: ₹ 37.80 crore)

A total of 19 national camps and 66 foreign exposure trips were supported for Paris cycle that included 10 TOPS core and 15 development wrestlers.

Apart from above, the Khelo India Scheme through Khelo India Talent Development identifies KIAs (Khelo India Athletes) across 21 Sports including para-Athletics, and nurtures them through supporting ecosystem in a Consent based approach leaving the freedom of choosing place of training to athletes.

The identification process for a Khelo India Athlete is based on specific guidelines and benchmarks laid down in the Protocols. In consonance with these protocols, a specialized committee namely the Talent Identification and Development Committee (TIDC) comprising of Olympians, prominent athletes, coaches of a particular sport are deputed to competitions wherein they identify deserving players and compile a Scouting List. Athletes selected are called for Assessment Camps and a final list of selected athletes is prepared in line with the protocols and the vacancies. The final induction of these athletes into the Khelo India Scheme as Khelo India Athletes is done after the approval of all TIDC members and the Competent Authority. The maximum approved number is 3000 athletes, out of which there are currently 2779 identified.

National Centres of Excellence (NCOE) SAI Training Centre (STC) Extension Centre of STC National Sports Talent Contest (NSTC) (its Sub-Schemes - Regular Schools, & Akharas) A total of 187 SAI Centres across the country including NCOEs and STCs, Extension Centres of STCs, NSTC schemes etc. are functional for implementing Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI. Presently, 9555 athletes (5736 Boys & 3819 Girls) are being trained in 34 sports disciplines on residential and non-residential basis. The identified young talents under SAI Sports Promotional Schemes belong to all sections of society including the rural, backward & tribal areas of the country. These athletes are

provided with regular training on Residential and Non-Residential basis as per the approved norms of the Schemes.

Sports Authority of India to provide support in the form of expert coaches, sports equipment, boarding, lodging, sports kit, competition exposure, educational expenses, medical/insurance and stipend as per the approved scheme norms.

Further, various initiatives have been undertaken as part the Khelo India Scheme for nurturing talents of the sports person:

A. Khelo India Centres and Sports Academies

Under this component of the Khelo India Scheme, Khelo India Centres (KICs) have been setup with the following objectives:

- i) Providing sports training/coaching to willing children.
- ii) Providing sustainable source of livelihood outside the Government set-up to past champion athletes.
- iii) To strengthen the sports ecosystem at the grassroots level by augmenting the utilization of existing sports infrastructure available at State, PSU, autonomous bodies, Schools, Universities and other organizations.

Current Status:

- i) A total of **1045 KICs** across the country have been notified till date across 36 States/UTs, out of which **937** KICs are currently operational and training **27,911** athletes.
- ii) As part of the capacity building initiatives, 691 (registered) Past Champion Athletes (PCAs) have been trained to inculcate correct techniques required for grassroots level training, which shall help in broad-basing the grassroots talent & act as a feeder.

B. Sports Competitions and Talent Development

The Khelo India Scheme through Khelo India Talent Development identifies KIAs (Khelo India Athletes) across 21 Sports including para-Athletics, and nurtures them through supporting ecosystem in a Consent based approach leaving the freedom of choosing place of training to athletes.

The identification process for a Khelo India Athlete is based on specific guidelines and benchmarks laid down in the Protocols. In consonance with these protocols, a specialised committee namely the Talent Identification and Development Committee (TIDC) comprising of Olympians, prominent athletes, coaches of a particular sport are deputed to competitions wherein they identify deserving players and compile a Scouting List. Athletes selected are called for Assessment Camps and a final list of selected athletes is prepared in line with the protocols and the vacancies. The final induction of these athletes into the Khelo India Scheme as Khelo India Athletes is done after the approval of all TIDC members and the Competent Authority. The maximum approved

number is 3000 athletes, out of which there are currently 2779 identified.

The Khelo India program provides comprehensive support to athletes, including scholarships, specialized training and coaching facilities, exposure to international competitions, and access to world-class training facilities, which entail funding of ₹6.28 lakhs per annum per Khelo India Athlete (includes ₹10,000 per month out-of-pocket allowance for each KIA) as follows:

- a) **OPA:** Khelo India provides scholarships worth ₹10,000 per month to talented athletes, ensuring they can focus on their training without financial burdens.
- b) Support through Accredited Academy (per Annum per KIA): Athletes have access to state-of-the-art training facilities, including sports complexes and academies, especially 301 Accredited Academies across the country. For facilitating training of KIA, Accredited academy is majorly supported as under:

Additionally, the scheme ensures that training and exposure opportunities meet international standards by providing specialized coaching for Khelo India Athletes at accredited academies.

Collaborating with private organizations working towards sports excellence through the initiative of Khelo India Accredited Academies.

Apart from above, SAI creates/upgrades infrastructure in its SAI centres only. Accordingly, to improve the infrastructure facilities for the training of the athletes, the State-wise, Year-Wise Project sanctioned including their cost during last 10 years are provided at **Annexure** – I.

Under the Sports Promotional Schemes of SAI, the details of facilities provided to inducted athletes in STCs are as under:

SAI TRAINING CENTRES (STC)

In order to groom the junior level sports persons in the age group of 10-18 years, SAI Training Centres (STC) are established in a State where the sports infrastructure is provided by the respective State Government where regular training is being imparted in 27 sports discipline. Trainees under the residential scheme are provided with Boarding for 330 days, Sports Kit, Competition Exposure, Educational Expenses, Medical Expenses and Insurance (Lumsum of Rs.1.50 Lakhs per head per annum) and under Non-Residential Scheme are provided Sports Kit, Competition Exposure and Insurance.

Further, the STCs act as a feeder centre for National Centres of Excellence (NCOEs) and National Coaching Camps (NCC). In the last 3 years, 139 athletes from STCs have been inducted into NCOEs and 183 athletes have been selected in NCC.

Further, in order to enhance talent of sportspersons the following scheme are being imparted:

1. Scheme of Assistance to NSF: Government provides assistance to elite sportspersons preparing for major international events such as Olympic Games, Asian Games, and Commonwealth Games etc. by providing funding support through its Scheme of Assistance to National Sports Federations (NSFs). Under the Scheme of Assistance to National Sports Federations, identified promising sportspersons/teams are provided all requisite facilities for their preparations including wholesome nutritious diet, food supplements, equipment, state-of-theart infrastructure, lodging, travelling facilities, services of reputed Indian and Foreign Coaches/supporting staff, scientific & Camp; medical support, sports kit,

etc. besides financial assistance for their training abroad and participation in international competitions in India and abroad.

2. Target Olympic Podium Scheme (TOPS):

Under the Target Olympic Podium Scheme (TOPS), Govt. of India (GOI) provides assistance to India's top athletes for their preparations for Olympic and Paralympic Games. Selected athletes are supported with funding from NSDF for customized training and other support not available under normal schemes of the Ministry. Out of pocket allowance (OPA) is paid @ Rs. 50,000/- per month to Core group athletes. Apart from OPA, entire expenditure for the training plan submitted by the sportsperson, which is considered and approved by Mission Olympic Cell (MOC), is met under TOPS.

TOPS Development Group athlete are receiving OPA of Rs. 25,000/-.

Apart from above, the Khelo India program provides comprehensive support to athletes, including scholarships, specialised training and coaching facilities, exposure to international competitions, and access to world-class training facilities, which entail funding of ₹6.28 lakhs per annum per Khelo India Athlete (includes ₹10,000 per month out-of-pocket allowance for each KIA) as follows:

- a) **OPA:** Khelo India provides scholarships worth ₹10,000 per month to talented athletes, ensuring they can focus on their training without financial burdens.
- b) Support through Accredited Academy (per Annum per KIA): Athletes have access to state-of-the-art training facilities, including sports complexes and academies, especially 301 Accredited Academies across the country. For facilitating training of KIA, Accredited academy is majorly supported as under:

These games have witnessed a total participation of 48639 athletes. Khelo India Centres & Sports Academies: Khelo India State Centre of Excellence (KISCE) under the Khelo India Centre and Sports Academies (KIC & SA) vertical of the Khelo India scheme. 33 KISCEs have been approved in 32 States/UTs. Till date, 4.16 Lakhs schools and 2.76 Crores students have already observed the Fit India WeekFit India Quiz is organised to raise awareness about health and fitness. In the latest edition of the Fit India Quiz, A total of 41,789 schools and 1,03,671 students registered for the Fit India Quiz 2023.
